CHAIR'S REPORT

In the ten months since the last AGM on 20 August 2022, Scottish Curling has prioritised the needs and interests of the members and worked closely with SIRA to ensure curling continues and grows within Scotland. With covid restrictions, hopefully, behind us for good, it was a pleasure to see ice rinks across the country return to full swing.

As we reflect on the season behind us, thanks go to Bruce Crawford, our CEO for twelve years, for all his effort, guidance, and hard work. We wish him well for the future.

I am pleased to be able to report that we have received a slightly increased investment from sportscotland for the next four-year cycle which is gratefully received.

The Board has continued to hold most of their meetings online, seven in total, which provided savings in travel time and travel costs whilst ensuring an almost full turnout at these sessions. The Board approved the MOU for the next four-year cycle at the end of 2022 along with the final Selection Policy covering the period to 2026. Further, the strategic plan for the 2023 to 2027 period is virtually complete following the recent online and in-person forums with members. Our thanks go to all those involved in putting the current version of the strategy document together. Moreover, the Board continually reviewed the Risk Register and have recently added some items addressing the present cost of living crisis. The Board have also proceeded discussions with the Scottish Curling Trust and the Scottish Ice Rink Association regarding the VIV (Vibrant Ice Rink Venues) project.

Try Curling has been at the top of our agenda to bring as many people of all ages and from all walks of life as possible into sport. The numbers attending Try Curling courses at rinks around Scotland have been encouraging – the challenge now, as always, is to convert the participants into members. I can assure that the development team are working extremely hard on this area. Huge thanks must go to them, all the volunteer coaches around the country, and the ice rinks for working together to achieve this.

The Audit Committee have a probably held the highest number of meetings of all the committees and our thanks go to them for all their input during a very difficult time. The appointment of Whitelaw Wells as our accounts has helped greatly in producing accurate reports – the finance section will provide more information on this area. Elsewhere, the Nominations Committee have been active in the recruitment processes, in particular the appointment of Interim CEO Vincent Bryson whose energy and enthusiasm have been welcomed. The Member Development Committee have also been busy, and our thanks go to them for all their time and input into bringing forward various ideas and solutions to increase the membership. Our thanks also go to the various other committees, including Competitions, Umpires, Rules, and Coaching, as well as to all the volunteers who give of their time to ensure the sport continues. I would like to extend a special thanks to the Area Standing Committee and the Ladies Branch Standing Committee for their hard work and involvement and wish them well for the future. The Board would also like to thank all the Scottish Curling staff; their hard work and effort over the last period is appreciated.

As Chair, I would like to thank the Board for their support, advice, and dedication that they have given myself and the members over the past four years and wish them well for future years.

I stand down today after several years involvement in the RCCC and wish Fraser all the best for the next three years. I am looking forward to some free time to spend on other activities and I look forward to meeting many of you on the ice next season.

CEO'S REPORT

Hello and thank you for taking the time to read the Annual Report of The Royal Caledonian Curling Club covering season 2022-23.

The first thing I would like to acknowledge is the length of service by former CEO Bruce Crawford who stepped down in December 2022. Bruce spent 12 years at the organisation and some outstanding on-ice achievements during his term remain as glorious memories, such as Olympic and world championship success for both men's and women's teams.

As for international sporting achievements this season, it was great to see European podium positions for Team Morrison and Team Mouat at the European Championships in late 2022 and both these sides subsequently being selected to represent Scotland at world championships. Our junior teams also did us proud with double medals at world level and with the senior teams also bringing home silverware, it was a great season across all generations. It was a pleasure to witness athletes excelling on domestic ice as well with curlers of all ages in action. From Under 13s Funspiel to the Masters, from Slams to the 2023 Scottish championships, the level of performance, commitment, and sportsmanship on display was a joy to watch.

February marked my first-ever Scottish national championships and I owe a personal thanks to everyone who took the time to introduce themselves and say hello during this excellent tournament. I was particularly proud of the Scottish Curling staff, partners, and volunteers who delivered an outstanding event viewed by over 19000 people on the BBC stream.

As the curtains draw on this season, I thank everyone once again for their commitment to keeping the sport as enjoyable as possible and to engaging as many people as possible. Fun was definitely on show wherever I went, and I am pleased to say I have been to many rinks throughout Scotland over the last four months. There are still a couple of major rinks and their members I haven't been able to visit yet though, so I hope to be able to rectify that sooner rather than later.

Whilst meeting people and learning about the members, rinks, and the rich heritage of curling has been a joyful experience, the harder elements of the day-to-day role have been around handling the uncertainty of the ice rink estate nationwide, a not inconsiderable issue for everyone associated with curling. I spent time with journalists, politicians, funders, and regulators as well as with the rinks and their staff to ensure Scottish Curling is consistently making the case at national level for the benefits ice rinks offer to communities and individuals. This must be something the governing body continues to do and something we ask all our members to play their part in, too.

I engaged with politicians and, in a first for curling, we were able to influence the creation of a parliamentary debate centred on Dewars Centre, Perth which took place on 31 May. Whilst Dewars was the subject, the underlying message was of the benefits a well-funded facility estate for all sports offers and we continue to press home this notion at every opportunity.

As we look towards the future, the Scottish Curling board delegated authority to the Strategy subgroup to design and create a transformational vision for the future of the sport in Scotland,

a difficult task in ordinary circumstances made doubly so with the aforementioned level of uncertainty the sport faces in the midst of crippling energy costs and a cost of living crisis.

We have engaged with members on the road and online, and although some sessions were very robust in the Q&A elements, I enjoyed every minute of the opportunity to meet, share and collaborate with members as we embark on a journey to correct the decline in membership and ensure the viability of ice rinks. It cannot be done in isolation, and I hope members, clubs, and rinks take the opportunity to engage directly with staff, board, and elected representatives to progress the sport for everyone. This will be a journey of imperfection with mistakes guaranteed along the way. However, it's a journey we can and must make together.

I'm looking forward to the future and seeing you all on the ice soon.

DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Our development efforts came on in leaps and bounds in 2022-23 with new initiatives, partnerships being developed on and off the ice, and the creation of a new strategic plan for the next four-year cycle. Besides running a variety of on-ice activities which addressed juniors and adults alike, this season has seen us break the natural barrier tying curling to ice rinks and develop a variety of ways to take the sport into communities.

We have hugely benefitted from the return of a third development manager, covering the North East, for the organisation. This means we now boast a full complement of staff to work directly with members, development groups, ice rinks, and partner organisations across Scotland.

NEW TRYCURLING.COM

We undertook efforts to make a number of improvements to TryCurling.com in April 2022 following feedback from ice rinks and users. TryCurling.com is a platform provided by Scottish Curling to form a go-to hub for Try Curling sessions and other beginner programmes. This allows ice rinks to promote their sessions and allows members of the public to find their most convenient event, link directly with their local rink, and book sessions.

During the 2021-22 season it became clear that the previous site was no longer fit for purpose and improvements were required to ensure the future success of the platform. As such, following the end of the season, Scottish Curling embarked on a five-month process of building a brand-new site with the support and expertise of our web developer. All the necessary tools for ice rinks to manage the advertisements, bookings, and delivery of their sessions themselves are included within the new website features.

This season TryCurling.com saw:

- 13 rinks engage and offer sessions
- 362 sessions offered with 802 spaces
- 403 bookings for 707 attendees
- 44 people attending more than one session

Moving forward to next season, plans are in place to continue the development of the customer experience on the website, including follow-up communications after session attendance.

CURLING'S COOL & SKILL AWARDS

1176 pupils took part in the Curling's Cool programme this season, our main initiative when it comes to getting a younger demographic involved in the sport, and a total of 118 Skill Awards were given out: 70 FUNdamentals, 33 Discovery, 15 Advanced.

STREET RINK AND FLOOR CURLING KITS

The Street Rink has continued to be a great asset to the sport's development, serving as a fantastic tool to bring curling out of the rinks and into the community as part of our member benefits. We have also offered floor curling kits as an alternative to the Street Rink for events. This season the equipment has been used by the governing body, clubs, and rinks in a variety of settings to promote curling. This included:

FLOORCURL PARTNERSHIP

A partnership between Scottish Curling and Rock Solid Productions was agreed in April 2022 to develop curling in Scotland via the use of iceless curling equipment. This provides Scottish Curling with access to RSP programming and training guides as well as educational equipment templates to facilitate the delivery of programmes which can then be used by members to further develop floor curling opportunities. Scottish Curling also receive a discounted price for the purchase of floor curling equipment which is accessible to members and partner organisations within Scotland.

In the last season the partnership has resulted in the purchase of:

- 33 Floor Curling Starter Sets
- 25 Pusher Sticks Sets
- Two Target Mats

... by the following organisations:

- Curling clubs/rinks (seven)
- Schools (two)
- Youth groups (four)
- Others (three)

JUNIOR CAMPS

Two junior camps were delivered this season in Dumfries with accommodation at Lockerbie Manor. First up, Summer Camp 2022 was held from 9 to 13 August 2022. This was our first residential camp since 2019. Fifty-five junior curlers took part in multiple on-ice and classroom sessions led by a team of seven coaches. The accommodation provided the ability to deliver

team building activities, including archery, games, climbing, and high ropes, which was a positive and well-received addition to the camp.

A slightly smaller camp was held during the Easter holidays 2023. The decision to trial a camp at Easter was made for a number of reasons: ice availability, an opportunity for participants to meet new people, and a chance to potentially line up a team for next season. Thirty-two children were accompanied by a coaching team of four. A similar camp schedule was delivered with social media and anti-doping off-ice workshops.

ADULT CAMPS

Two adult camps were held in October 2022 at North West Castle Hotel in Stranraer. Both camps were well attended with 52 curlers embracing the opportunity to experience top coaching and make new friends while at the residential camp. This year we welcomed curlers from Scotland and England, as well as two participants all the way from Alaska.

QUICK CURLING SOCIAL CUP

The inaugural Quick Curling Social Cup was held at Dumfries Ice Bowl on 13 and 14 August 2022 with free entry for teams. Ten sides participated in the event premiere, kindly sponsored by Hendrick's Gin.

NATIONAL CURLING DAY 2022

The second-ever National Curling Day took place on 15 November 2022. Our main aim for the day was to raise awareness of curling across the country by encouraging people to take part in an 'on the button' challenge and a celebration of members' achievements over the previous 12 months. Members, rinks, primary schools, active schools, and colleges took part online with an increased reach of up to 19 per cent on social platforms. We will continue to develop National Curling Day further each year.

FLOOR CURLING SCHOOL PROJECT

The Stewartry Active Schools team ran a programme to introduce floor curling to their schools; 12 primary schools took part in four lunch time and afterschool sessions across a four-week block. The total number of distinct participant sessions was 2420. Training was provided to the local Active Schools team, 12 teachers, and 17 Young Leaders to allow them to deliver the training within the schools. The Young Leaders also had the opportunity to attend an on-ice session with Graham Sloan at Dumfries Ice Bowl.

Each School held an internal tournament to determine a winning team which progressed to the Stewartry Floor Curling competition. Twelve schools were represented at the event with Borgue Primary winning on the day.

The floor curling activities were well received by pupils and students alike, 'Brilliant, thanks for organising. My class have loved this and so have I,' said one teacher from Kirkcudbright Primary. 'This is the most inclusive activity we have done in a long time. The pupils that normally shy away have stepped up and are loving PE; we have loved it as staff too.'

CURL CLEAN

We are proud to have achieved full compliance with the UK Anti-Doping (UKAD) Assurance Framework in March 2023. This framework outlines a series of mandatory requirements which all National Governing Bodies must fulfil; these include the creation of an education strategy and plan, the implementation of anti-doping rules, and increased Board involvement with clean sport.

Scottish Curling's anti-doping education has been delivered through e-learning and in-person workshops - a total of 80 athletes attended an in-person class in Perth in February 2023. Additionally, a dedicated Member of the Board has been named to promote engagement with clean sport. We also took part in UKAD's Clean Sport Week in May 2023, supporting anti-doping education through easily accessible information sessions and online resources.

AVIEMORE

Many will remember the bustling curling scene at the old Aviemore Ice Rink back in its heyday before the facility closed in the early 2000s – we are delighted that curling is now returning to the area. In 2021, some fantastic community drive and fundraising efforts enabled the creation of a new reduced-size ice rink in the town which is now thriving. The team at Aviemore carried out some brilliant work to promote curling by engaging with locals and tourists alike. This season:

- The rink hosted a Level 1 course in 2022 and thereby gained seven qualified coaches.
- 1000 people had a go at curling with regular Try Curling sessions held on Saturday mornings.
- Collaboration with a tour operator introduced sessions for tourists every two weeks.
- Work with Aviemore Primary School brought 40 children on the ice with some of the participants now pushing for the creation of a junior club.

Progress has been enormous in the short time since the reopening and the Aviemore and Glenmore Community Trust have many exciting propositions to expand the rink and to increase opportunities. These include the set-up of an inclusive Gateway Club and the installation of a heritage trail celebrating the history of curling in the area. Additionally, the rink team plan to form partnerships with all schools in Badenoch and Strathspey, working with headteachers and Active Schools coordinators. We hope this success story continues and can serve as a case study for similar initiatives across the country which Scottish Curling will continue to support.

COMPETITIONS REPORT

The 2022-23 season started with the return of the Asham U21 Slam series, the first competition once more held at Greenacres. It was great to see the junior teams return to the ice after the summer break and, equally, we were pleased to welcome back our umpires who kept ensuring our events ran smoothly for yet another winter. Quite fittingly, we went full circle over the course of the season and our last competition also took place at Greenacres where the Newcomers' Trophy saw 34 new curlers introduced to the competitive side of the sport.

In between the Asham U21 Slam Greenacres Junior Masters and the Newcomers' Trophy, we held a total of 35 competitions with 534 teams competing, meaning a whopping 2064 curlers took part in our events over the season. The Asham U14 series saw Team Rutherford win three out of the four slams to become overall champions. The team boasted an average age of 12.5 years while, on the other end of the scale, the Scottish Masters were won by Team Gray on the men's and Team Adams on the women's side, coming in at an average age of 64. This age range and the variety of entries demonstrates that curling truly is accessible for all ages, as well as being hugely social and beneficial for players who keep practising the sport.

After several disrupted seasons as a result of Covid-19 and the unpredictability that came with it, the numbers above are highly encouraging and show that people are still passionate about curling and keep supporting their local ice rinks. This support is needed now more than

ever; one way for members to do their part is to make their way to a rink and either participate in a competition themselves, or cheer on family and friends who are playing.

A massive thank you, as always, goes to the involved committees (Competitions, Umpires, Rules), all the local organising committees, ice rinks and their staff, sponsors, and the many volunteers, ranging from umpires and time clock operators to line-scorers. Their assistance and knowledge are invaluable in the successful running of our competitions.

SCOTTISH CURLING JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

The national junior curling championships at Curl Aberdeen saw six days' worth of gripping curling action. On the women's side, Team Mitchell went through the round robin stages undefeated but were just pipped to the post by a single point in the final, missing out to title defenders Team Henderson. Meanwhile in the men's competitions, Teams Strawhorn and O. Carson were equally matched on seven in one records post round robin play and met again in the final. It was all square after nine ends, but Team O. Carson scored in the last to clinch the trophy.

SCOTTISH CURLING MEN'S AND WOMEN'S CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Scottish Championships returned to Dumfries Ice Bowl this February and what a great week it was! Team Morrison and Team Mouat stayed undefeated throughout the round robin and went on to claim the trophies, although the finals were a lot tighter than some might have expected! Runners-up came in form of Team Young, who had formed specifically for the national women's championship, and Team J. Craik who missed out on the title by just a single point.

The team at Dumfries worked tirelessly to ensure all games were broadcast to as wide an audience as possible with round robin fixtures available internationally via Recast and the play-off games streamed on BBC iPlayer with just under 20,000 viewers tuning into the live action.

SCOTTISH CURLING SENIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

Lanarkshire Ice Rink once more hosted the Scottish Seniors with great success. Team Lockhart were tied with Team Wyllie after six ends in the women's final and it all came down to the late stages where the title defenders first scored, then stole to retake the trophy. Elsewhere, the men's final between Team Connal and Team Kennedy went to and fro before the Perth side capitalised on an error in judgement from their opponents and scored big in End 7, earning them victory.

KEY DEVELOPMENTS THIS SEASON

- Reviews of the online entries process for competitions have been and continue to be made.
- Feedback from competition surveys has been reviewed and relevant changes have been and continue to be implemented.
- Improvements have been made to line scoring and DSA average information has been added to the results section of each competition's webpage, allowing teams to see their scores live.
- Enhanced marketing plans for each competition helped to promote the respective event and increase participant numbers.

INTERNATIONAL COMPETITIONS

Scotland once more enjoyed a successful season on international ice with a total medal haul of three golds, four silvers, and three bronze across all disciplines (men's, women's, juniors, mixed, doubles, mixed, wheelchair).

The winter got off to an emphatic start when Scotland's mixed clinched silver on home soil in Aberdeen. The European championships followed in November. Team Mouat represented Scotland on the men's side and bagged their third title in as many appearances while, on the women's side, Team Morrison made their Europeans debut and brought home bronze. The year concluded with the world junior-Bs where Team Henderson successfully competed for a spot in the upcoming world junior women's championship and indeed secured silver. Heading into 2023, the world juniors were the first event on the calendar for Scotland's national teams. Team Henderson went from strength to strength in Fuessen, Germany and capped the week off with gold. As title defenders, Scotland were pre-qualified on the men's side where Team O. Carson made their debut carrying the Saltire and achieved bronze. The world wheelchair and world wheelchair mixed doubles championship followed suit. Both Scotland teams kept growing throughout the competition and the squad of Gregor Ewan, Hugh Nibloe, Gary Logan, Jo Butterfield, and Meggan Dawson-Farrell took bronze while the duo of Charlotte McKenna and David Melrose narrowly missed the play-offs.

Next up were curling's two flagship events, starting with the world women's championship in Sandviken, Sweden. Scotland were once more represented by Team Morrison who made their proper world's debut after their 2022 campaign was hampered by Covid-19. Despite not making the play-offs, the team showed great performances and promise for the future. On to the world men's where Team Mouat were chasing that elusive gold medal. Indeed, they played a fantastic competition and clinched gold, the very first for Team Mouat and the first since 2009 for Scotland. The combination event of world mixed doubles and world seniors once more concluded the season. Scotland's gold run at the world mixed doubles came to an end when, despite a strong performance, Jen Dodds and Bruce Mouat missed out to eventual champions United States in the qualification games. However, the trip to Korea was well worth it for Scotland as both the senior women's, Team Lockhart, and the senior men's, Team Connal, side won silver.

Scottish curlers also competed as Great Britain at the Winter World University Games in Lake Placid, USA. Team J. Craik had a phenomenal tournament that culminated in the gold medal while Team Henderson did themselves proud with a fourth-place finish.

FINANCE REPORT

The turnover for the year ending 30 April 2023 was £1,126,686 - £3,086 less than the previous year. The position at the end of the financial year shows a deficit of £89,570 which has reduced our general reserves. In consequence, this means reserves held by the organisation now stand at £102,095 or 9% of turnover.

Membership subscriptions amassed to £200,930 which shows an encouraging four-per cent increase from pre-pandemic levels (£193,592 in 2019-20). We have, however, experienced significant inflation in our ongoing cost base over this time. The membership subscription will improve further if the number of new members increases while fewer people leave the sport.

We continued to receive significant investment of grant funding from sportscotland which increased to £685,450 in 2022-23. We spent £461,897 on various activities, staff, and programmes to develop the sport and increase participation from grassroots to the pathway last season. It is crucial that we continue to invest in this area to secure the future of the sport.

We continue to incur heavy expenditure in relation to international competition cost which include flights and accommodation for those representing Scotland on the world stage, including significant support for para programmes. We ran a full range of domestic competitions in 2022-23 with entries gradually stabilising again following a mixed post-covid season. The domestic competitions, however, are still consistently running at a substantial loss which we are working towards addressing in season 2023-24. We were pleased to continue the collaboration with key commercial partners, such as Asham as title sponsor of the slam series. The success and popularity of our competitions this season laid some encouraging foundations to securing new sponsors in the future and actions are already in motion. Expenditure includes payments to Directors authorised by the full Board. The international and competition expenditure areas are not grant-funded and therefore require to be covered by membership subscriptions, entry fees, sponsorship, and other miscellaneous income. Servicing these areas has a significant impact on the overall budget. A lack of commercial partner income and reduced broadcast income in 22/23 both negatively impacted the overall generated income and increased the irrecoverable VAT cost.

This is the second year running the Club has made a loss and the Board, Audit Committee, and Interim CEO continue to work together to find ways to improve the financial position of the organisation, targeting to break even in 2023-24.

With the new TryCurling.com website going live, we made an investment into promoting the Try Curling programme in a commercial campaign with the Herald Group. This included full page spreads and online articles in several of the Herald Group's publications across Scotland. The ice rinks reported a good turnout with more than 400 bookings for Try Curling sessions. We expect this to positively impact participation in curling and boost our membership going forward.

Whitelaw Wells have been successful in their work with us to ensure we are getting the most out of our Xero accounting system and in providing management accounting support. We also appointed FourM Accountants to conduct a full financial audit of the 2021-22 accounts; they will also audit the 2022-23 accounts.

We would like to thank all those involved in taking care of the finances throughout the year and in the preparation of the annual accounts, in particular Suzy Wakefield, Nicola Glencross, and the members of the Audit Committee: Janine Wilson, Fraser Montgomery, and Graham Lindsay.

INCLUSIVE CURLING REPORT

Our involvement in and promotion of inclusive curling received a major boost this season with the return of a dedicated Disability and Inclusion Development Officer to Scottish Curling. We were delighted to be able to collaborate with other organisations as well as to develop our own programmes to aid inclusion in curling.

SCOTTISH WHEELCHAIR CURLING ASSOCIATION

Our partnership with Scottish Wheelchair Curling Association has grown this season, largely thanks to the implementation of a Disability and Inclusion Development Officer within Scottish Curling. This has allowed for closer collaboration between both groups. SWCA have been integral in supporting the development of our new strategy and, in turn, we have supported them by attending their competitions and supporting new members enter the sport.

SCOTTISH DISABILITY SPORT

Our partnership with Scottish Disability Sport has likewise continued to grow. We have taken part in several multisport events throughout this season and offered floor curling activities to those in attendance. Floor curling proved hugely popular among participants, and we are now regularly being invited to SDS multisport and other events courtesy of this success. We attended the following events to offer an introduction to curling:

- Aviemore
- Wheels to Stadium
- Inverness
- Muscular Dystrophy

FUNDING/FLOOR KITS

We are delighted to have gained funding this season to support the set-up of a new floor curling programme involving ASN schools and relevant organisations. The funding for £8,000 has been spent on floor curling kits that will allow the sport to be more accessible to disability and inclusion groups. Additionally, we will be able to use the scheme as an outreach programme within local authorities and local communities.

KIDZ TO ADULTZ

The Kidz to Adultz exhibition was held in September 2022 at Ingliston Showground and we were fortunate enough to secure the fun zone and promote curling to participants there. We attended with our Street Rink where fun was had by many visitors and service users. This, in turn, also allowed us to create partnerships with other organisations such as Guide Dog Scotland who we are now accessing training services with that will aid coaching for visually impaired curling.

CHARITY COME AND TRY DAYS

We held a come and try session for veteran charity Blesma this season. The event served to encourage those accessing Blesma's services to try curling. Furthermore, South Lanarkshire Wheelchair Curling Club opened a club session to the charity Finding Your Feet, allowing service users to come along to a friendly come and try. Both sessions were very successful with a number of participants returning to the rinks.

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS REPORT

We continue to delegate high-calibre individuals to support the World Curling Federation in its governance, leadership, and development of the sport across the world.

The WCF's 2022 Annual General Assembly, held in Lausanne, Switzerland, saw Kate Caithness stand down as President after 12 years of holding the position. 'Kate from Curling' started engaging with World Curling back in 1998 and has seen - and overseen - much change during her 24 years with the organisation. She has been a tremendous ambassador for Scottish Curling throughout and has been instrumental in promoting wheelchair curling; it was due to her efforts that the discipline was introduced to the Paralympic programme in 2006. We thank her for the work she has put in. Kate was awarded the Olympic Order at her final AGA by IOC President Thomas Bach.

Beau Welling from North Carolina was elected as the new WCF President.

Some changes have taken place over the last few years in Governance of the WCF which were overseen by the Structure Review Group. Details of these can be found on the WCF website.

MARKETING REPORT

We were delighted to be able to be run a number of successful marketing and promotion campaigns in season 2022-23 which served towards raising the profile of curling and increasing participation in the sport. Besides continuing established positive practice, we introduced some novel projects which were generally well received and allowed us to explore new opportunities.

SCOTTISH CURLING CHAMPIONSHIPS

We significantly increased the amount and variety of media output for the 2023 Scottish Curling Men's and Women's Championships compared to previous years which was generally received very well. In the run-up to the tournament, we ran a countdown on social media with each post featuring a fun fact about a participating team. All 16 teams appeared in these. Written reports on the website were updated after each draw and all results were additionally shared on our social media channels. We improved athlete exposure and access by conducting video interviews after each draw which were posted to our social pages. These frequent media scrums were a welcome novelty for the event and created near 1,400 interactions across our platforms. Another novelty for this season was the production of fun Meet the Teams videos with all participating rinks. This allowed fans a more personal access to the athletes and achieved great feedback from followers, both in spoken word towards Scottish Curling staff and in near 800 interactions across Facebook and Instagram. They were also well received by the athletes with many commenting that they enjoyed the filming process and videos.

Thanks to a brilliant effort from Dumfries Curling, all championship games were streamed online on Recast, select matches featuring expert commentary. Additionally, from the play-off games onwards, games were available on the BBC. The great success of these broadcasts strengthened our relationship with the BBC and boosted a continued partnership for the championships in coming years. We were also pleased to have ITV Border in the arena on finals day with the championships featured in their news programme.

Onsite, we installed a number of activities to engage visitors and increase the profile of the championships. This included a photo booth with props which was popular with both the participating teams and spectators. On select days we ran a sweeping challenge in the rink where everyone was invited to have a go with a smart broom and put their sweeping skills to the test. Additionally, we were pleased to be able to welcome Eve Muirhead to Dumfries Ice Bowl for a Q&A session on finals day which was well attended.

TRY CURLING PROMOTION CAMPAIGNS

Early this season we worked with the Herald Group to run a widespread Try Curling promotion campaign across a number of their publications. This included full page spreads in Best of

Scotland Magazine and The Herald Magazine as well as (online) articles in The Herald and the Glasgow Times which were also shared on their respective social media accounts.

Additionally, we were delighted to place curling in The Week Junior, a UK-wide, weekly children's magazine. Featured on the magazine's Do Something page, curling was promoted as a fun activity for everyone and pointed Try Curling out as the first point of call to get into the sport.

YOUR CURLER

Our online members' magazine, Your Curler, continued to be released monthly and was emailed directly to subscribed individuals. In response to issue with our previous publication platform, we tried different publishing programmes this season to ensure accessibility for all our members. Additionally, we introduced direct download links in the emails which allowed subscribers to obtain an offline pdf copy of the magazine to enjoy.

NATIONAL CURLING DAY

For this season's National Curling Day we ran what effectively was a draw shot challenge, asking people to make a draw to the button without any sweeping – on the ice or off it.

Furthermore, Trophy Tuesday on National Curling Day gave a shoutout to a number of achievements by our members so far this season and encouraged others to share their moments of glory. We featured, among others, Sorn CC clinching the illustrious Eglington Jug, Ardlach CC defending their title at the Inverness Skins as a tribute to their late president, Glasserton CC winning the Wigtownshire Rink Championship for the first time in more than 50 years, and the delegation on the Scotland Women's Curling Tour USA 2022 bringing the Marguerita Roberts Quaich back home. Many of these pieces came with quotes from the winners on what their respective piece of silverware means to them. Additionally, we used the occasion to celebrate the anniversaries of curling clubs around the country.

WORLD WOMEN'S DAY

We were proud to honour World Women's Day 2023 with a dedicated magazine titled WeCurl that highlighted some of the inspirational women involved in our sport. The magazine is still available online. Feedback on WeCurl was generally very positive and even received praise from Maree Todd, Scotland's then Minister for Public Health, Women's Health, and Sport.

This followed on from a successful Women and Girls in Sport Week earlier in the season where we collaborated with **sportscotland** and welcomed Miss Todd to Inverness Ice Centre for a Try Curling session. Local female curlers were onsite to show the minister the ropes and share the joys of the sport. They spoke passionately about why they love curling and underlined the health and social benefits that come with playing.

COLLABORATION WITH EXTERNAL MEDIA

We managed to improve and strengthen our collaboration with external media this season which resulted in increased exposure of the sport. Our media desk was in frequent contact with publications across the country, sharing media resource packages and assisting in gathering additional content to suit a publication's needs. Especially our relationships with the Stranraer Free Press and the Perthshire Advertiser prospered with a multitude of curling-related content appearing in their papers. We also managed to tap into the World Mixed Championship 2022, held at Curl Aberdeen, to create excitement. Our greatest success in relation to this tournament was placing an article on the front page of The National, featuring Robyn Munro discussing not only the championship but also the benefits of curling and encouraging people to get involved in the sport.

Furthermore, we were encouraged by a fair number of times Scottish Curling/RCCC representatives were invited to speak on local and national radio. This included, among others, comments on the USA Men's Tour to Scotland 2023 and the success of the Scottish national men's team at the world championship in Ottawa, Canada.

SCOTLAND REPLICA KITS

Working with Foxglove, we were finally able to act upon notes of interest and offer the opportunity to purchase official Scotland replica kits. We continue working towards providing a more comprehensive range of merchandise with a number of promising developments now becoming apparent.

PERFORMANCE REPORT

The Scottish Curling Academy's 2022-23 season was a successful, packed, and enjoyable one with plenty of highlights and positive developments. Slam champions, Scottish champions, and world medallists are clear standout achievements for the Academy this season. However, the 'little wins' are just as important for the development of our upcoming athletes.

REGIONAL ACADEMY

The Regional Academy set-up continued to reach out to the youngest and newest members of our pathway. The athletes were based in six hubs across the country: Curl Aberdeen, Dewars Centre, Dumfries Ice Bowl, Greenacres Curling, Inverness Ice Centre, and Moray Leisure Centre. Shining through at all of them was the passion of the volunteer coaches who ran the sessions for the 30 athletes this season. Scott Andrews (Academy Coach) enjoyed visiting all six hubs to assist in nurturing the talent.

The 30 Regional athletes were offered the opportunity to attend three full training days at the National Curling Academy where they got a taste for all things performance curling: psychology, technical slide analysis, sweeping analysis, weight control analysis, fitness, and nutrition to name but a few. It has been hugely rewarding to witness the return that the athletes see on these visits – the value of the inspiration that these days provide should never be underestimated.

NATIONAL ACADEMY

Sixteen National Academy athletes completed their fortnightly training sessions at the National Curling Academy. All 16 curlers have shown great commitment to the programme in consistently attending and making the most of these sessions. For the first time this season we introduced fitness testing to both Academy programmes with the aim of enabling athletes to benchmark themselves as well as setting themselves some measurable goals. This was well received by the athletes and is something we look forward to continuing into next season.

The Academy teams have received partial funding for 12 international competitions this season, which marks a huge increase from the five partially funded tournaments in season 2021-22, the smaller number there mainly being owed to the Covid-19 pandemic – hopefully, this will be the last annual report with the mention of Covid-19! The success of these teams at the Scottish Championships demonstrates the vital need for enabling them to keep gaining experience at international competitions. These trips could not have gone ahead without the help of the following coaches: Alison Cunningham, Alison Milne, Jamie Strawhorn, Ryan Carson, Scott Andrews, and Sophie Jackson.

Foxglove have continued to be great sponsors of the Scottish Curling Academy. Their financial assistance allowed us to support the Nordic Junior Curling Tour trip where two teams plus a coach were able to gain experience from the international event.

Nine previous Academy programme athletes stepped up the pathway into the British Curling Performance Foundation Programme this season. These two organisations continue to work together to support athletes transitioning through their sporting careers. The athletes' dedication to training and competing is what has allowed them to progress, and the Academy is extremely proud of their progress.

TALENT ID DAYS

The Academy debuted two Talent ID events this season which were held in April at Dumfries Ice Bowl and the NCA in Stirling. They were open invitations to any athlete looking to either take their first step onto the performance pathway or to rise through the pathway. Both days followed the same structure with athletes taking part in five activities, on and off the ice, which were designed with the intention of assessing every athletes' potential across the game, not just within their current physical curling performance. Scottish- and British Curling coaches were strongly encouraged by the talent, the vast number of 71 athletes attending, and the individual potential displayed.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT REPORT

This season saw the return of many courses and workshops for coaches and umpires being delivered in person. However, there were still some workshops delivered online to make

learning and development more accessible for everyone. The Umpire- and Coaching Committees continued to support the Workforce Development Manager in areas of pathway and development opportunities.

COACHING COURSES AND WORKSHOPS COMPLETED IN 2022-23

- Level 1 Coaching: 70 attendees over seven courses
- Child Wellbeing and Protection in Sport (CWPS): 107 attendees over 11 courses
- Basic Tactics: 21 attendees in one course
- Advanced Tactics: 15 attendees in one course
- Introduction to Mixed Doubles: 12 attendees in one course
- Rules: 12 attendees in one course
- Key Principles of the Delivery: Nine attendees in one course
- Basic Sweeping: Eight attendees in one course
- Ready, Steady, Curl: 23 attendees over two courses

Overall, a total of 277 individuals attended the 26 courses held across the 2022-23 season (April 2022 – April 2023). Thirty-eight coaches qualified at Level 1 while seven qualified at Level 2. Scottish Curling now boasts 389 qualified coaches, 156 of them female and 233 male. One hundred and eleven trainee coaches are currently working towards their Level 1 and Level 2 qualifications.

It must be noted that 2022-23 was the last season that the current Level 1 and 2 formats were delivered. There will be a new qualification called the Scottish Coaching Certificate (SCC) coming into action next season. This will be known as SCC – Curling Level 1, and SCC – Curling Level 2.

COACHES

sportscotland introduced a new funding stream for coach education and awarded Scottish Curling £1280 to help support the delivery of courses and workshops, targeting areas of accessibility, affordability and equality, diversity, and inclusion.

The Coaching and Development Conference planned to be held in person for the first time since 2019 sadly had to be postponed due to the death of our patron, HRH Queen Elizabeth II. It went ahead in November 2022 and included an on-ice development afternoon at Dewars Centre, Perth and featured guest speakers Alan Hannah and GB cyclist Jenny Holl who presented online.

TUTORS

Scottish Curling currently have 14 qualified tutors. Two more sat the professional PDA tutor training course and will qualify for the upcoming 2023-24 season.

OFFICIALS

Throughout the year, 65 active umpires supported the various Scottish Curling competitions. The World Curling Federation organised two new courses at Curl Aberdeen in October 2022, namely the WCF Educators Course and the Game Umpire Course, which were attended by four new umpires and one qualified umpire respectively. Additionally, LSD software has been developed and will be made available to officials starting next season. Regrettably, the Umpire Refresher Day this winter was cancelled due to the death of our royal Patron.

VOLUNTEERS

The number of volunteers continued to grow this winter and it is thanks to the commitment and passion of these individuals that our competitions could successfully go ahead. Two Ready, Steady, Curl courses were held this season with 23 attendees.

ICE TECHNICIANS

The World Curling Federation organised a Maintaining Curling Ice course at Curl Aberdeen which was attended by seven curlers who kicked off their career as ice technicians there, and two current ice technicians who became newly qualified as WCF educators.

We are pleased to report that Scottish Curling has maintained a 100 per cent compliance with the sportscotland Standards for Child Wellbeing and Protection in Sport for another year.

We have continued to provide support and guidance to member clubs and rinks throughout the season, covering PVG Scheme memberships and other training including CWPS and CWPO workshops. Assistance has also been available to clubs and rinks for case management, offering advice and signposting, to ensure members are being supported and to aid them move through challenges within the sport.

This season has also incurred a number of professional training and upskilling opportunities, including follow-up discussions on the publication of the Whyte Review and the associated learnings and implications on the sporting safeguarding landscape within Scotland.

Scottish Curling continue to actively review our policies and procedures to ensure that we meet best practice guidelines and do everything possible to make curling safe for everyone.
